## 86 Project To Be Set

The State Highway Commission has announced that plans are moving ahead for improvement of N.C. 86 north of Hillsborough.

Thomas S. Harrington, highway commissioner, answering a request from Harvey Bennett, chairman of the Orange County Board of Commissioners, said that funds had been set for improving Highway 29 but those funds may be put aside for N.C. 86.

Harrington said it is too late to act this year but that "I feel it can be handled so that there will be no further delay." The '86 work is to be "reinstated at an early date." Harrington expressed appreciation to Bennett for his "highly-cooperative spirit."

## Rural FD Asks Calls From Area

Persons not solicited thus far for membership in the new Orange Rural Fire Department are asked to call officials, if they desire to subscribe.

"Our response from rural areas has been good," Clark said, "but contacts with our suburban areas has been poor."

Clark also said that subscriptions thus far total \$16,500 toward a goal of \$20,500.

## Grant Made For Poverty

The Joint Orange-Chatham Community Action Inc., with headquarters in Carrboro, has received a grant under the Federal Economic Opportunity Program.

Money and the program are designed to aid low-income residents of Orange and Chatham counties.

Mrs. Mary B. Holmes is chairman of the board of directors.

Orange County voters, apparently, will go to the polls in record numbers in the May 4 primary.

That conclusion is based on almost complete new registration figures released by the county elections board.

Cates this week released figures showing a total registration of 16,425. This compares with the previous figure of 12,817 at the end of the old registration period in 1962. The new total is expected to reach 17,600 when final figures are in.

Joy swept through the Republican Party camp as the new figures were released. They showed new GOP registrants amounting to 870 compared with a previous total of 1,657. Democrats jumped 2,328 compared with a previous 10,952. The Republican jump was almost 50 per cent while

that of the Democrats was 25 per cent.

The figures, as released by Cates, did not include several large precincts. He estimated the total registration would be increased by 1,100 when final figures are in, a total increase of possibly 35 per cent.

The total figures, by precinct, do not include independent and "no-party" registrations. Cates said there were a total of 193 independent registrations and 48 no-party registrants.

Polls will be open May 4 from 6:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.

In addition to the voting for candidates, voters in Chapel Hill will cast ballots on bond issues totalling \$1,720,000 for improvements ranging from sewer and street work to a new municipal building and playgrounds.

## Variety of Faces For Voters May 4

Democrats will have four ballots to fill out in Saturday's primary election—one for statewide officers, one for United States senator and member of Congress, one for district judge and county officers, and one for the county school board.

Republicans will have only one ballot, since they have primary contests going for only three state offices, the United States senatorship and member of Congress.

The Democratic ballot for governor lists Lt. Governor Bob Scott of Haw River, attorney and former state highway commissioner Mel Broughton of Raleigh, and Charlotte dentist Regina L. Hawkins.

Candidates for lieutenant governor are H. Pat Taylor, a 14 year veteran (and a Speaker of the North Carolina House of Representatives), Mrs. James M. Harper of Southport, a onetime chairman of the North Carolina Federation of Women's Clubs, and Frank Matlock of Greensboro, an attorney formerly with the

North Carolina Attorney General's office.

Veteran State Treasurer Edwin Gill is opposed by Sneed Hig, onetime state representative from Fayetteville, who was also state Commissioner of Revenue for four years.

Attorney General Wade Bruton is opposed by State Senator Bob Morgan of Harnett county.

Labor Commissioner Frank Crane is opposed for that office by John Wardell of Jamestown, who ran third behind Crane in the 1964 primary.

Insurance Commissioner Edwin S. Lanier, a former Orange County Commissioner and State Senator, is opposed by insurance adjuster George Belk, teacher John Whitley of Statesville, and Insurance

## High C Decision

The North Carolina Supreme Court has affirmed a decision of the Civil Court of Orange County giving legal effect to zoning laws affecting the city and, in particular, of Chapel Hill.

The ruling released here last week was handed down by the high court April 22. Coleman, attorney for plaintiffs, and Lucius Chalmers, lawyer for Orange County, were not sent copies. However, a copy is in the office of Clerk of Court Frank Frederick.

Coleman said, "I don't know what action, if any, we'll have taken with this and have not received any opinion of the decision. I do not have any dissenting opinion." The suit was filed Dec. 14.

## Residential Mail Delivery Assured for Hillsborough

**Galifianakis Piedmont Provision Sales, Plans Made Says Order Now Official**

The Town of Hillsborough will receive "door-to-door" mail delivery within "the next two or three weeks."

That word came to the News of Orange County this week from Rep. Nick Galifianakis, upon receipt of such notification from Washington.

Galifianakis said he had been informed delivery will start as soon as "house numbering is complete in Hillsborough."

The representative said he had worked toward door-to-door service for Hillsborough for several weeks (since the News of Orange brought the matter to the fore) and has been advised by Howard R. Walker, deputy postmaster general, of the action that now is to be taken.

"The request has been approved," Galifianakis said. "The next steps will be up to your town and post-office."
