

Retiring Teacher Sets Resolution Of Appreciation

Hillsboro—In accordance with the standing policy of the Orange County Board of Education, Miss Rebecca Liner, a public school teacher in the schools of Hillsboro and North Carolina for 37 years, was retired from duty at the close of the current school year.

At a session last week, the board passed a formal resolution of appreciation for Miss Liner's fidelity to duty and faithful services. Miss Liner, through whose classes have passed thousands of primary students of this community and the surrounding area during her long tenure, had sought to continue teaching but the local committee and the county board both held fast to the previously announced policy.

The resolution signed by Chairman C. W. Stanford and Secretary G. P. Carr was as follows:

"Whereas, it is the policy of the Hillsboro Local Committee and Orange County Board of Education to retire teachers at age 65,

"And, whereas, Miss Rebecca Liner has reached the age of 65,

"And whereas, Miss Rebecca Liner has served nobly and well in the public schools of Hillsboro and North Carolina for a period of 37 years;

"Be it resolved, therefore, that this Board go on record as praising Miss Rebecca for fidelity to duty and hereby expresses grateful appreciation on behalf of the students, teachers, principal, superintendent, and board members for her faithful services over a period of 37 years.

"It was moved by Kemp S. Cate, seconded by Harry P. Breeze, and carried, that a copy of the above resolution be sent to Miss Rebecca Liner and to the press, and that the resolution be spread upon the minutes of the Board of Education of Orange County."

No Candidates In Orange Report Campaign Costs

Not a single Orange County candidate for office in the May 31 primary filed the sworn statement of pre-primary expenditures and contributions by last Wednesday, the deadline, as required by law.

There are 10 Democratic candidates in the May 31 primary.

State election laws required the candidates for county offices to file sworn statements of expenditures and contributions with the clerk of Superior Court 10 days before the primary and again within 20 days after the primary.

Failure to comply with the law is termed a misdemeanor.

Clerk Edwin Lynch admitted that few Orange County candidates ever met the letter of the law in filing the statements of expenditures and contributions. He said he did not know of any Orange County candidate having ever been prosecuted for not filing the statements as required by law.

DRAFT BOARD TO CLOSE

The local draft board will be closed Friday, May 30 in observance of Memorial Day.

All other principals in the county system are expected to be back for next year.

Republicans Also Voting in Primary

Republicans will participate in the Orange County primary election Saturday when they cast their vote in the two-man fight for the G.O.P. nomination for lieutenant governor.

William C. Lebew and Warren H. Pritchard have filed for the office of the second ranking State officeholder and they are the only candidates local Republicans will be called upon to vote for Saturday.

Ballots for the election have been received by the local elections board and final preparations were under way today in the office of Elections Board Chairman E. J. Hamlin for delivery of ballots and election supplies to precinct officials tomorrow.

Hamlin reported the receipt of numerous requests for absentee ballots, both from members of the armed forces and civilians. Election laws do not provide for the casting of absentee ballots by civilians in primary elections, but members of the armed forces are granted the privilege.

Thursday is the final day for members of the armed forces to apply for absentee ballots.

Saturday to Be Poppy Day Here

Saturday will be Poppy Day in Hillsboro and throughout the United States.

Millions of Americans will observe the day by wearing memorial poppies in honor of the nation's war dead and by making contributions for the welfare of war's living victims, the disabled veterans and needy children of veterans.

Women and girls of the American Legion Auxiliary, and co-operating organizations, will be on the streets from early morning with baskets of crepe paper poppies made by disabled veterans, offering everyone an opportunity to pay individual tribute to the war dead by wearing one of the little red memorial flowers. No price will be asked for the poppies but contributions to the rehabilitation and child welfare funds of the Auxiliary will be received.

All of the Auxiliary's poppy workers will be unpaid volunteers, giving their services for the dual purpose of honoring the dead and aiding the disabled. Among them will be members of three generations, wives, mothers, sisters and daughters of men who have served America in the three wars of this century. The poppy distribution is being directed by Mrs. Fred Seagraves, Poppy Chairman of Hillsboro American Legion Auxiliary Unit.
